BRIEF HISTORY

- In 2023 the Chippewas of Nawash Golf Tournament along with Chief and Band Council sponsored and fundraised to provide a pilot project within Nawash to incentivize learning Anishinaabemowin overseen by Social Services.
- Classes were conducted once per week for two different groups and the response was overwhelmingly positive and enthusiastic.
- With letters of support from past learners, we applied to the Coldwater Trust to provide a more formalized process and were successful in securing the funding for instructors and learners alike.
- Two instructors were recruited, and 26 spots were given to community members for incentivized learning however the desire to learn was so great that our instructors graciously took on more learners in unpaid spots.



PROGRESS

We are currently on week 8 of 18 weeks that will end in a weeklong immersion camp style format.

Online format allows participation regardless of location

Our instructors will be consulting with learners on how to conduct the immersion camp at the end of the project

Honorarium: Modest financial assistance for personal expenses related to class attendance in the amount of \$25.00 per hour of class instruction

Commitment: Participants sign a letter outlining expectations and responsibilities.

After graduating with his Bachelor's, he taught Anishinaabemowin briefly at the Kikendaasogamig Elementary School in Neyaashiinigmiing before returning to complete his Master's degree and celebrating the birth of his first child. He enjoys spending time with his family and speaks to his new son in Anishinaabemowin.

Robert has started teaching an adult beginner class through Kenjgewin Teg in M'chigeeng, which will be conducted entirely online. Robert is an active band member of the Chippewas of Nawash Unceded First Nation.

Both instructors are accomplished and fluent speakers of Anishnaabemowin

2025 Nawash Anishinaabemowin Learning Incentive Budget

We requested \$144,102.40 from Coldwater Trust, with our in-kind contribution being \$4,320.00. We are so very pleased to report that Coldwater funded our entire project this year.

Cost Categories: Wages, consulting costs, materials, project management, equipment costs, childcare support, honouraria, and the full week-long immersion camp among other expenses.
